THE FORMAT OF THE KUNSTHALLE HAS HAD DIVERGING HISTORIES IN EUROPE AND THE US. IN EUROPE, THESE INSTITUTIONS WERE OFTEN FOUNDED DURING THE SECOND HALF OF THE NINETEENTH CENTURY IN PARALLEL TO PUBLIC MUSEUMS DEDICATED TO THE COLLECTION AND DISPLAY OF HISTORICAL CULTURAL ARTEFACTS. THE ARCHITECTURES OF SUCH EARLY EXAMPLES GIVE AN INDICATION OF THE DEMANDS TOWARD THESE INSTITUTIONS. IN THE US. THE FORMAT OF THE KUNSTHALLE AS A NON-COLLECTING SPACE FOR CONTEMPORARY ARTISTIC PRACTICES SEEMS TO BE MORE DIRECTLY CONNECTED TO AN INSTITUTIONAL CRITIQUE TOWARD ESTAB-LISHED MUSEUMS. BOTH IN EUROPE AND THE US THE KUNSTHALLEN WERE THE FIRST TO SHOW THE AVANT-GARDES FROM ACROSS THE ATLAN-TIC. WITH THIS CONFERENCE, WE WANT TO SHED LIGHT ON HOW THE KUNSTHALLEN HAVE CON-TRIBUTED TO A HISTORY OF CONTEMPORARY ART.


